Annual Report Highlights

DMCC Celebrates 60 Years of Parks and Conservation

In 2022, we celebrated our 60th year as a county conservation department. In cooperation with the Partners for Conservation Foundation, we celebrated with a banquet at Parkside Brewing Co. in October. There, we drew the winners of the “60 for 60 Raffle” where we gave away 60 items in celebration of the six-decade milestone. The proceeds from the raffle went to support department operations.



So Many New Things...

This fiscal year saw lots of new things for us including a new county website, the new raffle and banquet noted above, new staff at the nature center, and a new fiscal situation on account of a significant budget reduction.

Additionally...

In an effort to secure additional revenue, we proposed a **new lease program for our FEMA Buyout Areas** along the Tama Road corridor. However, after a significant amount of public input against it, the Conservation Board chose to scrap the idea.

We added a **new feature at the shooting range at Big Hollow**. Range members can now shoot at clay birds with shotguns on the 50-yard range using permanently mounted throwers on either side of the range. The ability to shoot shotguns at moving targets was a much-demanded feature that we're thrilled to finally be able to offer.



In a **new development for water quality on Big Hollow Lake**, the Des Moines County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) hired a full-time watershed coordinator after a multi-year effort to get the proper plans and funding in place. Filling the position is Frank Boyer who previously worked for Wapello County Conservation. Frank's job will be to work with landowners in the lake's 4,400-acre watershed and connect them with programs and funding to implement conservation practices that will reduce the amount of nutrients reaching the lake.

And finally, we secured **new funding for continued development at Big Hollow Recreation Area** including donations from Ideal Ready Mix, Witte Foundation, Murray Foundation, Wilson Family Foundation, USG Foundation and several other community donors. These funds were used to leverage grants from the Land and Water Conservation Fund and Fish Habitat program. All told, nearly \$400,000 has been secured to add campsites, build two new sediment ponds, and improve accessibility in the park. We anticipate the projects taking place in the fall of 2023.

Staff Update

In August of 2022, Kelly Rundell left the department to take her passion for outdoor education back to her home area in northern Minnesota. In September, then-Naturalist Marcus Nack was promoted into the Environmental Education Manager position vacated by Kelly's departure. The Naturalist position was left vacant for a while before Jacklyn Goodman was selected for the role, first as part-time, then as full-time Naturalist. Prior to her promotion, Jacklyn had been serving as the department's Americorps/4-H Program Naturalist.

Two field interns joined the team for the summer of 2023. Trenton Gebhardt returned for his third summer with the crew and Grant Swanson joined the team for his first summer at Des Moines County Conservation. He had served previously as a seasonal with Henry County Conservation. Both interns are students at Iowa State University.

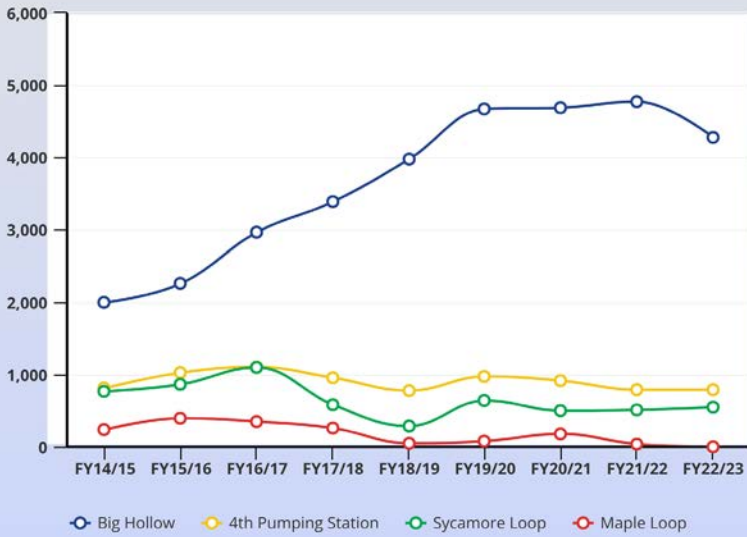

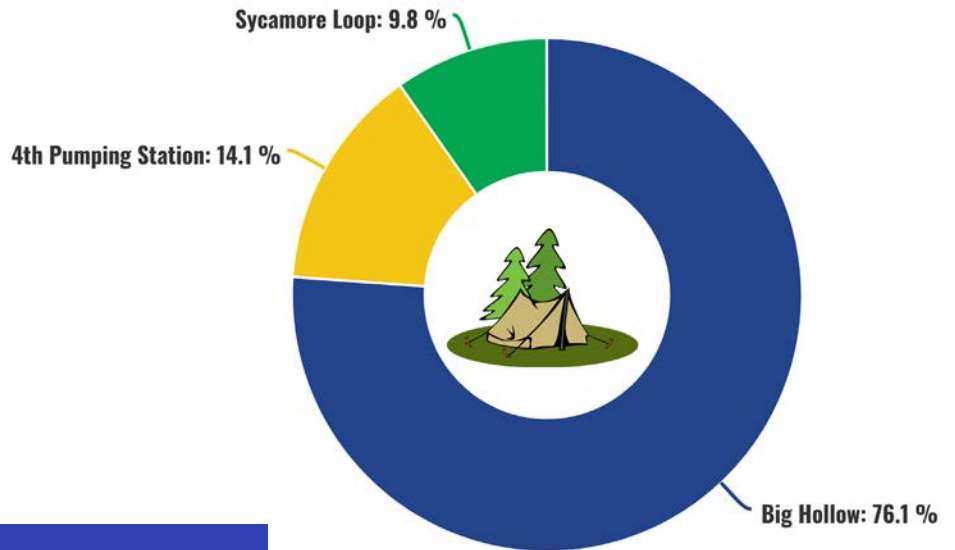
Shooting Range Membership

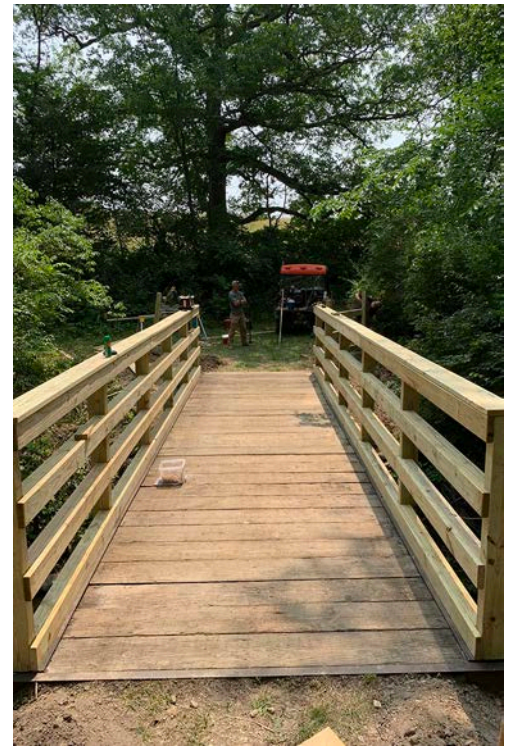

Land Stewardship

LAND STEWARDSHIP

More than ever before, Des Moines County Conservation has been striving to manage its forested acres, specifically at Big Hollow but in other parks also. This year, staff and volunteers applied more prescribed fire to forested lands throughout the park system. The goal with these fires is to reduce the prevalence of invasive species, manage for native species such as oaks and hickories, and improve habitat for many species, including the endangered Indiana bat.

Private Land

- 130.8 acres of native grasses / pollinators planted
- 41.6 acres of prairie burned

Public Land

- 12.4 acres of food plots planted
- 17.4 acres of timber stand improvement (TSI)
- 53 acres of prairie burned
- 78.35 acres of timber burned



Big Hollow Water Quality Project:

Big Hollow Lake suffers from excess nutrient loading, specifically phosphorous, resulting in large algae blooms and increased pH. The water is still safe — we test it all summer long to be sure of that. The algae and floating plants just make things like boating, fishing, and swimming a bit less appealing at times. Therefore, the lake has been designated as an “impaired” water body in the state of Iowa.

Frank Boyer, the new Big Hollow Watershed Coordinator was officially hired through the NRCS on March 6, 2023. Since then, Frank has been laying the groundwork for a full roll-out and implementation of actions during FY23/24. Much of the early work included specific education on the watershed, including Watershed Academy training, pond design training and conservation planning and application of practices.

Frank has scheduled and met with several landowner / stakeholders within the watershed to discuss options for best practices to reduce nutrient and sediment introduction into the Big Hollow lake. Thus far, landowner’s / stakeholder’s have committed to 443 acres of cover crops for Fall planting, with another 80 acres signed up but not yet approved, plus an additional 78 acres interested in strip-tilling.



ENVIRONMENTAL/CONSERVATION EDUCATION PROGRAM

Activities of the EE Program Staff

Programs, Events, and Services

The Environmental Education department had a productive year, successfully delivering a wide range of public programs and initiatives while fostering valuable partnerships with various organizations. Throughout the year, the department organized several annual public programs, including Eagle Watch, Owl Prowls, Outdoor Youth Jamboree, Summer Celebration, Monarch Watch, Hike a Park series, Earth Day Clean Up, Youth Summer Camps, and hosting Hunters Education. These programs provided educational opportunities, outdoor experiences, and community engagement, promoting environmental awareness and conservation.

In addition to the annual programs, the department also implemented non-annual public programs such as Bike a Trail, Hook N Paddle, and Bat programs. Bike a Trail encouraged community members to explore local trails through guided biking events, while Hook N Paddle engaged participants in fishing and kayaking activities, promoting outdoor recreation and environmental awareness. The Bat programs aimed to dispel misconceptions and educate the public about the importance of bats in ecosystems.

A significant development for the department was the hiring of Jacklyn Goodman as a full-time Naturalist, adding valuable expertise and resources to the team. With her contribution, the department was able to enhance its program offerings and provide more comprehensive environmental education to the community.



The Environmental Education staff also played an active role in delivering in-school programming and organizing field trips, providing students with interactive learning experiences and fostering environmental literacy. Furthermore, the department made education kit rentals available to local schools, enabling teachers to incorporate hands-on environmental education into their classrooms and enhance the learning experience for students.

The department's commitment to building strong relationships with partners at PIECES, Kiwanis, Burlington City Parks, and surrounding conservation groups was evident. These partnerships were fostered and strengthened throughout the year, enhancing collaborative efforts in environmental education and conservation initiatives. By working together, the department and its partners were able to leverage their resources and expertise to create a more significant impact on the community.

Overall, the Environmental Education department's annual summary reflects a successful year of engaging the public, educating youth, and fostering environmental awareness. Through their diverse program offerings, dedicated staff, and collaborative partnerships, the department has made a positive impact on the community's understanding and appreciation of the natural world while promoting a sense of environmental stewardship.
